Douglas J. Slawson is professor of history at National University in San Diego. He earned his doctorate from The Catholic University of America. Professor Slawson served first on the faculty of St. John's Seminary in Camarillo, California, and later on the faculty of St. Thomas Theological Seminary in Denver, Colorado. After several years on the faculty at National University, he moved into administration where he held various posts, including dean of students and vice president for student affairs. He returned to teaching, his first passion, in 2007. His most recent book is *Ambition and Arrogance: Cardinal William O'Connell of Boston and the American Catholic Church*. His book *The Department of Education Battle, 1918–1932*, won the Cushwa prize for the study of American Catholicism awarded by the Cushwa Center at the University of Notre Dame. Slawson is also author of *The Foundation and First Decade of the National Catholic Welfare Council* and co-author of *Church and Slave in Perry County, Missouri, 1818–1865*. His articles have appeared in the *Catholic Historical Review, American Catholic Studies*, the *Americas, Church History*, the *Missouri Historical Review*, and *Vincentian Heritage*.
