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

1. WELCOME BY OFFICERS OF THE ASSOCIATION

Welcome to Chicago and the 106th Annual Meeting of the American Catholic Historical Association (ACHA).

2026 marks the 17th time the ACHA has participated in the American Historical Association (AHA) conference in Chicago since our founding in 1919. Previous conferences in the city took place in 1938, 1941, 1944, 1950, 1953, 1959, 1962, 1974, 1984, 1986, 1991, 1995, 2000, 2003, 2012, and 2019.

The ACHA's first Chicago meeting was held December 28–30, 1938, at what was then called the Stevens Hotel (which opened in 1927 as the "greatest hotel in the world" and is now the Chicago Hilton). This was the 53rd annual meeting for the AHA and the 19th for the ACHA. During that gathering, AHA President Frederic L. Paxson gave the AHA presidential address, "The Great Demobilization," at the annual AHA Dinner. At the ACHA Presidential Luncheon, Sister M. Celeste Leger, R.S.M., Ph.D., dean of St. Xavier College, delivered a paper entitled "A Proposed Reorganization of History Teaching in the Catholic Colleges of the United States."

Local arrangements for that inaugural Chicago meeting were organized by the President of Loyola University Chicago, Very Rev. Samuel Knox Wilson, SJ, Ph.D. The opening and only ACHA session was chaired by Monsignor Thomas V. Shannon, LL.D, and featured papers by Sister Mary Ambrose, B.V.M. ("The Social and Religious Life of the Gildsman of Toulouse"), Rev. Raphael N. Hamilton, S.J. ("The Significance of the Frontier to The Historian of the Catholic Church in the United States"), and Edward P. Lilly, Ph.D. ("A Major Problem for Catholic American Historians"). Each of these papers was subsequently printed in the *Catholic Historical Review*.

Our meetings have certainly grown since then. This year, thanks to our Program Committee wonderfully led by Tim Dulle, Jr. of The University of Scranton, we have over 30 scholarly sessions and events scheduled.

The ACHA has grown in other ways as well. While the 1938 Business Meeting reported an investment balance of \$5,500, I will share at this year's meeting that our portfolio now stands at nearly \$2.2 million. The generosity of our members has allowed for a robust budget, which permits a wide range of activities led by our volunteer committee members, from the Global Catholic Studies Network initiatives to our Hidden Collections web series.

The ACHA is supported by two subsidized staff members—myself and Allison Isidore of the University of Iowa—and our web administrator, Andy Metzger. I am personally indebted to Allison and Andy, who performed above and beyond the call of duty this past year by stepping up to take on additional responsibilities. I also wish to thank our Executive Council and our many gracious members; I am certain we have the most creative and kind membership of any scholarly association.

I hope you are looking forward to being together in Chicago as much as I am—to get to the bottom of our historical topics, to plan for our future, and to reconnect with friends.

2. INTRODUCTION TO CHICAGO AND THE 2025 ANNUAL MEETING

Welcome to Chicago for the 2026 Annual Meeting! We are pleased to offer a wide variety of panels and outings this year which are well suited to the storied history of Catholicism in our host city. Chicago has been an important center for our association – we most recently gathered here in 2019, and this year's meeting marks our 17th assembly in The Windy City!

Our Call for Papers invited ACHA members to consider topics related to Chicago history, particularly the many Catholic communities which have called the city home, Chicago's place in regional Catholicism, and the long history of religious activism here. Fittingly, these subjects are well represented across our program. Our program also features programming which will allow us to continue conversations about ACHA staples of recent years – clergy sexual abuse and its coverup, the nuances of assembling and maintaining archival collections, and, of course, nuns.

This year, we made a special effort to include panels dedicated to religion and visual culture. On Thursday, **Nuns on Film** will explore the legacy of women religious on screen, and the complicated cultural work these women have performed over the last century. On Saturday, in **US-China Visions in Transnational Fragments: American Jesuit Filmmaking in Cold War China, 1947–49**, Joseph Ho will screen long-lost footage with an intriguing archival history. Also on Saturday, **Eastern European Catholicism in America: Visual Approaches to Devotion, Diaspora, and Documentation** will showcase the architecture of various Eastern European Catholic groups in Chicago and across the Midwest. Each of these panels highlights thoughtful scholarship complemented by compelling, visually-driven presentations.

There will be two Thursday "Field Trips" this year. Deborah Kanter's storied "Churches of Pilsen" walking tour will offer participants a chance to study the history of ethnic succession in the neighborhood, where formerly Czech, Croatian, and Polish parishes remain vibrant today as parishes for Mexican Catholics. The Archdiocesan Archives of Chicago has also graciously agreed to host a group of ACHA members for a tour; many of our members have relied on these archives to craft field-defining work for decades now, and those who attend are in for a treat. (Pre-registration is required for both of these events.)

Of course, many of our favorite annual traditions are back for 2026. On Friday, the ACHA Presidential Luncheon will include the presidential address, and recognition of our annual prize, award, and grant winners. Friday night, all members are invited to participate in the organization's Business Meeting at 5:15pm. This year's iteration of our annual "Weird Catholicism" event, **Blurred Lines: Catholic Flirtation** takes place at 7:00pm at the Gallery Cabaret (2020 N. Oakley, pre-registration required). On Saturday evening, the annual ACHA Mass is scheduled for 6:30pm at the beautiful Saint James Chapel (835 N. Rush), just a short ride up the Red Line. Our ACHA Social will immediately follow back near the hotel at Half Sour (755 S. Clark).

Our program will look different in two ways. While our Presidential Panel has traditionally been held right after the Luncheon, this year, the ACHA Presidential Roundtable: Catholicism and Disability at the Intersection of History and Practice, will take place at 7:00pm on Thursday, January 8. The roundtable will bring together six experts on the topic to ask "What does it mean to live – and think – with disability and Catholicism together?" Immediately following Friday's luncheon this year, at 1:45pm, we invite all ACHA, AHA, and ASCH attendees to join us for Pope Leo XIV: Perspectives on the First American Pope, the Contemporary Catholic Church, and the Study of American Catholicism. An all-star panel of prominent commentators has been invited to share their thoughts on "Chicago's First Pope," Leo XVI, his election, his relationship to recent ecclesial history (especially the legacy of Pope Francis), and current events related to his papacy. Spread the word and bring a friend or three.

On behalf of this year's Program Committee, including Michael Pasquier and Kate Dugan, I thank the intrepid staffs of the ACHA and the AHA (especially Jake Purcell), who have made this conference possible. ACHA is, to me, the high point of the academic year, and I look forward to another meeting full of stimulating conversation and community building.

Registration for the 2026 American Catholic Historical Association Annual Meeting closes on December 20, 2025. The ACHA registration fee is \$40.00. Starting on December 21, a late registration penalty of \$15 will be charged for the ACHA Meeting.

If you are presenting a paper or serving on a panel as a chair, speaker, or commentator, you are required to register for the American Historical Association's Annual Meeting. 



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


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
