Associate Vice President of Research The University of Iowa Overview

- **In my university-wide administrative role as AVP Research I oversee and support faculty research** in all of our twelve Colleges. This includes: The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Colleges of Education; Law; Nursing; Public Health; Business; Libraries; Engineering; the Graduate College; Medicine; Dentistry; and Pharmacy. I meet regularly with the Associate Deans of Research and Associate Deans of Faculty and have been able to thrive in this role because our VP Research hired me to grow the position

over the past several years. I have been able to create new initiatives and collaborate with wonderful colleagues and have received funding and support from across campus.

- **I oversee two OVPR Centers which report directly to me: The Obermann Center for Advanced Studies (OCAS) and the Center for Social Science Innovation (CSSI).** I was able to oversee and help manage major leadership transitions (Directorships) in both units (2022-2024) and work closely with the new Directors of OCAS and CSSI and their teams. I spearheaded the internal reviews of the centers as well as the internal search and hiring process for both Director positions. Currently, the OCAS annual operating budget is just under \$500K and CSSI's annual operating budget is just over \$800K. I also work closely with the Office of Undergraduate Research (OUR) which has a dotted line to me and their budget is just under \$400K.
- **My leadership style is highly relational, and I thrive in connecting with faculty and administrators across campus as AVP of Research.** Along with my meetings with Associate Deans and faculty, I meet with and support Ph.D. students and their research. I meet with faculty and students 1-on-1 as well as in group meetings over coffee and tea. These listening and support sessions are invaluable as it helps me understand the needs of our faculty and graduate students so I am able to better support them and connect them with other resources across campus as well as externally. Faculty development has been a major focus of mine these past four years and even before in my DIP and Rhetoric administrative leadership roles.
- **Over the past several years I have developed a scaffolded system of writing for the public for our faculty and graduate students** largely through my \$270,000 internal P3 grant "Writing for the Public Good." Faculty and graduate students have benefitted from the various workshops offered through The Conversation U.S., the OpEd Writing Project, and the Alan Alda Science communication sessions. These workshops, as well as 1-on-1 sessions with professional editors, have helped our faculty and graduate students pitch their research to a variety of public-facing venues.
- **My OVPR initiatives are also highly collaborative, and I work closely with the Office of the Provost and Office of the President,** as well as with the twelve Colleges across campus to reinforce a university culture of celebrating research and writing. The OVPR now (with the enthusiastic support of the President and Provost) regularly celebrates faculty's book publications through our highly anticipated **Book Matters** series held each semester, and our popular **Creative Matters** series held with Hancher Auditorium.

- **I have expanded OVPR's Arts & Humanities Initiative (AHI) internal funding for research and creative work in the arts and humanities** and have assembled a robust network of internal grant reviewers that includes faculty as well as staff who oversee and support grant writing. Today, OVPR's AHI program now funds \$165,000 (from \$150,000 when I started in this role) in start-up funding for individual research, conferences, and major projects. I have expanded collaboration with the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences (CLAS) to include a CLAS-OVPR co-funded Summer Humanities Research Awards for faculty. OVPR provides half of the funding, \$40,000 for individual summer research projects. OVPR also gives \$65,000 in subvention funds each year to CLAS and I work with the CLAS Associate Dean of Research to award this “bookend” funding.

Some Key Accomplishments and Initiatives as Associate VP Research

- 1) **Named New Directors of Obermann Center for Advanced Studies and Public Policy Center. Co-Created a New Board-Approved Center: Center for Social Science Innovation [2022-2024]**

As AVP of Research I oversee two Centers on our University of Iowa campus: The Obermann Center for Advanced Studies (OCAS) and the Center for Social Science Innovation (CSSI; formerly the Public Policy Center, PPC). I have had the honor and privilege of naming Dr. Mark Berg as Director of CSSI and Dr. Luís Martín-Estudillo Director of OCAS. OCAS is humanities-centric, interdisciplinary hub for faculty and students and CSSI supports social science research among faculty and students. I have worked closely with Dr. Berg to remake and revision what was a struggling center and is now, as the reimagined and Board-approved CSSI, a place for innovative social science research. CSSI provides pre-award, award period, and post award support. As new Director of the Obermann Center, Dr. Martín-Estudillo and his team are focusing on internationalizing the OCAS, facilitating interdisciplinary research and teaching opportunities on campus; and creating new opportunities for Arts and Humanities scholars. I work with both Center Directors to identify external sources of funding.

I also work closely with OVPR unit Office of Undergraduate Research (OUR) and work with the Associate Deans of Research and Faculty in the following Colleges: Education; Law; Nursing; Public Health; and Business.

- 2) **Awarded a \$270,000 University of Iowa P3 Grant for “Writing for the Public Good” <https://research.uiowa.edu/writing-public-good> [2023-2026; 2026-2027 no-cost extension]**

Developed the “Writing for the Public Good” program to provide expert training and support for public-facing research for our faculty, staff, and students. This has been a highly successful

initiative which builds on our OVPR summer Communicating Ideas workshops <https://research.uiowa.edu/communicating-ideas-workshop>; and extends to writing academically informed, journalistically styled articles for **The Conversation** <https://theconversation.com/us>; **Alan Alda Science Communicating Science workshops** <https://research.uiowa.edu/tags/alan-alda-center-communicating-science>; and **Spring Writing Retreats**. Starting in the spring 2025 semester we will offer one-hour workshops for faculty, graduate students, and postdocs on how to pitch their research to The Conversation.

3) **Created BOOK MATTERS**

It has long been a passion of mine to support and celebrate our faculty and their accomplishments. One of my first actions as AVP Research was to develop our “Book Matters,” events and they have become popular events where we celebrate scholarly excellence and to showcase faculty authors. We partner with Prairie Lights bookstore Iowa City and feature University of Iowa authors each fall and spring semester. <https://research.uiowa.edu/book-matters> In addition to the Fall and Spring Semester Prairie Lights book events, we host a large Book Matters celebration every two years. <https://research.uiowa.edu/event/156191/0>

4) **REVAMPED CREATIVE MATTERS [2022]**

My OVPR team and I rebooted what had been a dormant program of featuring University of Iowa as well as visiting performing artists. Month into my job as AVP Research we reached out to the new Director of our university’s Hancher auditorium and formed a partnership where OVPR helps to support two events per year with Hancher under the Creative Matters marquee. 8) PROMOTED PUBLIC-FACING RESEARCH IN THE STATE OF IOWA. RESEARCH FOR IOWANS.

Secured \$10,000 in funding from the OVPR to co-host and sponsor an inaugural Iowa History Conference with my State Historical Society of Iowa (SHSI) colleague Dr. Andrew Klumpp. Our goal was to bring together faculty, student, and independent scholars together for a truly public-facing conference. It was by all accounts a big success. Over one hundred Iowans from across the state attended to day-long conference to hear about various aspects of Iowa history from experts. University and college professors from across the state of Iowa, along with Iowa museum directors (incl. African American History Museum; Living History Farms; Danish Museum, Military Museum) presented their research on Iowa and delivered their research findings in accessible ways for the wider public. <https://research.uiowa.edu/iowa-history-conference> A highlight of the conference was Iowa Public Radio ‘Talk of Iowa’ host Charity Nebbe, an Iowa celebrity, who recorded live a roundtable discussion that focused on the importance of telling Iowa’s stories.
